Gerard Libaridian holds a doctorate in history from UCLA. He has taught Europe, Near Eastern, African and Armenian/Caucasian history at the University level and lectured extensively in North America and Europe. He is the author of two edited volumes and many published articles on Armenia, the Near East, and the Caucasus. He has served as editor of the *Armenian Review* (1983-1988) and was founder and director of the Zoryan Institute for Contemporary Armenian Research and Documentation in Cambridge, Massachusetts (1982-1990). From 1991 to September 1997, he served as an Advisor to the President of Armenia and as First Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs. From 1994-1997 he was the Senior Advisor to the President of Armenia for Foreign Policy and Security Issues. During that time he acted as chief negotiator for the Nagorno Karabagh conflict and coordinator of conflict related policy in the Office of the President.
